# **1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

# **1.1 INTRODUCTION**

Rayat Shikshan Sanstha is one of the largest and leading educational institutes in India. It is recognized as the biggest educational institution in the Asia in terms of both quality and quantity. The Sanstha was founded by Padma Bhushan Dr. Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil in 1919 for its main objective to impart education to the poorest of the poor through self-help; irrespective of caste, creed and religion. The motto of the Sanstha is '*Education through self-help*'. The college runs '*Earn and Learn Scheme*' which reflects the value of self education and dignity of labor. Adhering to this objective, the Sanstha has started Arts, Science and Commerce college, Mokhada in 1984 for overall development of 'Adivasi Community'.

The College has been established by keeping into mind a mission of educating tribal, downtrodden and economically weaker sections of the society. The college is located in the tribal and hilly area of Mokhada tehsil of Palghar district (Maharashtra). In the Mokhada tehsil, this is the only higher education institute aided by Government of Maharashtra and U.G.C. providing education to the tribal area community. The students hail from about 100 distant villages and 'Pada'. About 90% students come from inaccessible area of the tehsil. 98.72% students belong to reserved categories and out of this 89.87% belong to scheduled tribes.

The college is recognized by the University Grants Commission with 2 (f) and 12 (b) and affiliated to University of Mumbai, Mumbai. The college was started in 1984 with Arts and Commerce faculty, while Faculty of Science was started in 2013. The college offers traditional and technical programmes in the conventional, non- conventional and professional modes. The college runs 3 streams viz. Arts, Science and Commerce with 9 UG programmes viz. Economics, History, Marathi, Commerce, Botany, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics and Zoology and 1 PG programme i.e. History. Apart from this, the college imparts skill and career oriented education through 3 short term courses sanctioned by National Skills Qualification Framework (NSQF). The college runs 22 add on /certificate courses and short-term courses.

To provide higher education facilities to the tribal students and prepare them to compete with urban students and to contribute their services to nation building by promoting quality education

# **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

#### **Curricular Aspects**

Effective curriculum delivery is carried out through different committees, meetings, teaching plans, academic diary and syllabus completion report. College prepares the academic calendar for different curricular and cocurricular activities. Academic diary is prepared for teaching learning process. Departmental meetings are organized at the beginning and end of each semester. Syllabus is distributed among the faculty and faculty prepares their teaching plan at the start of each semester. University has prescribed project-based system as a method of internal evaluation for certain programs conducted by the institute. Continuous internal evaluation of the students is made by conducting home assignments, seminars, unit tests, quiz, N.S.S., sport and cultural activities. All the 10 programs having Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). The college has offered 50 add on/ certificate courses to 1507 students during the last five years. Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human value, Environment and Sustainability into the curriculum. In order to make our students aware of the community life, the college offers 57 courses in which, such issues are addressed. Through extension activities the students are sensitized to various social issues affecting the society. While teaching the prescribed syllabus college organizes various activities such as blood donation, Tree plantation, AIDS awareness camp through NSS. Ladies welfare committee organized workshop on 'women empowerment' program. 10% courses having experiential learning through project work / field work. Total 83.15 % students undertook project work / field work during the last academic year. Feedback system in the College helps the management and faculty to understand the effectiveness of teaching methodologies in the curriculum implementation. The students are encouraged to give their feedback on the effectiveness of the curriculum delivery. The college obtained feedback from Students, Teachers, Employers and Alumni. All the feedbacks are analyzed and taken action on it. These feedbacks and action taken report are also available on the website of college.

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The institution has transparent admission process catering to students from tribal communities and minorities. 90% students are from below poverty line and from first-generation learners. Admission process follows rules laid down by University of Mumbai as per reservation policy. The college applies various student-centric teaching-learning methods and tools such as field projects, survey method, project-based learning, various academic softwares, ICT enabled classrooms etc. are incorporated for enhancing teaching-learning processes.

Total 28 teachers are employed on full-time basis for UG and PG courses during last academic year. Continuous evaluation of students through semester wise and CBCS pattern of University of Mumbai. Additionally, college level tests are conducted for internal evaluation. Evaluation methods involve class assignments, tutorials, oral examinations, project and classroom seminars. Teachers use ICT enabled teachinglearning process through e-resources, power point presentations, LMS software, video-conferencing, PPT Bank, College YouTube channel 'ASC College Mokhada', Google classroom etc. Institution has adequate infrastructure for ICT and all teachers use e-learning resources for effective teaching extensively. IQAC initiated positive steps for slow and advanced learners.

Institution organizes field visits, skill development programmes, special counselling and lecture sessions for effective delivery of course curriculum. Average pass percentage for last five years is above 80% for all programmes and results are higher than university average percentage. Mentor-mentee system is introduced in all the departments and helps in sorting out students' grievances. The bonding between students and teachers due to such practices helps in keeping the morale of the students high. The faculty are highly qualified, committed and experienced who show greater participation in curriculum enrichment programme and syllabus

related workshops.

The students' performance and learning outcomes-based education (OBE) were integrated in the system. The Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes are defined in the syllabus and implemented properly which has resulted in improvement in the pass percentage, knowledge, skill, competencies and overall holistic development of students. Three students have qualified SET examination in the subject like History and Commerce. Students' progression and placements are achieved in all the disciplines.

#### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

To inculcate the research culture among the students and staff the institute have sanctioned 21 institutional minor research projects in 2021-22 and 18 institutional minor research projects in 2022-23. The college has a major research project of Rs. 29.68483 lakhs, funded by SERB-DST Government of India. Total grants sanctioned from government and non-governmental agencies for research projects to the institution during the last five years are Rs. 27.615 lakhs. Recently College in association with The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI) sanctioned with major research project titled "Innovative Interventions in Mokhada Block of Palghar District to Address Malnutrition and Enhance the Livelihood of Scheduled Tribe (ST) Communities" with total cost of Rs.150.12307 lakhs for three years. The Institutional Incubation Centre has been launched in the year 2020-21 to instill innovative ideas and develop research culture among students. The institute has conducted 48 state, national and international seminars, webinars, workshops, and conferences. The faculty members have published 40 research papers in UGC CARE list journals and other 91 publications in books, book chapters and papers published in national/ international conference proceedings and journals. The extension activities are carried out in association with government organizations like Tehsil Office, Municipal Council, Panchayat Samiti, etc. and NGOs like Deepak foundation, Aroehan foundation, Patangshaha Kutir Hospital Blood Bank. The college has received recognition for IPR from the office of the Controller General of Patents, Designs, and Trademarks. The college achieved "Best NSS Unit" and "Best NSS Program Officer" award from the University of Mumbai. College also recognized from the TERI, Navi Mumbai, JM Financial Foundation, New Delhi and Patangshaha Cottage Hospital Blood Bank, Jawhar, etc. A total of 69 different extension activities conducted during the last five years. The college has made collaboration with other institutes and colleges as well as NGOs and have collaborated 37 MoUs and 60 linkages for faculty exchange, student exchange, field trip, tribal art culture, research and other academic activities have been fostered during last five years.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The college has developed good infrastructure to support the teaching and learning activity. The old building is added up with the new building and administrative block for which financial support of Rs. 4 crores is given by our parent institution. The college functions through 4 separate blocks. Block-A is for administrative purpose with meeting hall; Block-B contains advanced scientific labs and spacious classrooms; in Block-C there are library, reading room, language lab, exam department, NSS room, two classrooms, students' welfare and development centre, skill development centre, Gymkhana and in Block-D there are well equipped three Digital Saksharta Labs, smart class room, competitive examination & IBPS centre. Further the college campus is having a canteen, cafeteria, staff quarters, principal's residence, guest house, security guard room, vehicle parking, botanical garden, a training center of biofloc system and a playground.

The college has established Digital English language lab terminals. Students learn the phonetics with the help of ACE digital language lab software. The language lab is well equipped with 10 computers and essential

accessories. The library is with the support of all necessary subscriptions of e-resources including N-List. The library is having ILMS software named LIBRERIA. The college is also having 'Vriddhi ERP' software for campus management, complete student life cycle and administrative work. The college library is enriched with 21,697 books comprising of great novels, autobiographies, encyclopedia, reference books, text books etc. For prompt services in the library the facility of WEB-OPAC system. The college has good focus on updating IT facilities. Every year the computer ratio per student has been increasing and at present the ratio is 4.74. Further the internet facilities are constantly upgraded with recent advancement having speed of 200 mbps. The college also gives equal importance to maintenance activities and allocates good amount of budget for maintenance. Further, for maintenance related activities the college has made AMC with Microsys, Vriddhi software solutions Pvt. Ltd., G. K. Enterprises and MKCL agencies. AMC are made available for Library, Vriddhi ERP, Examination, Tally and LIBRERIA softwares.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

The college works keenly for student support and progression. Our college is located in the tribal and remote area and to support education of students the college has availed various scholarships to students. The beneficiaries of the government scholarship account for 75.56 % on an average in last 5 years. Further each year the college provides award in form of money to 3 meritorious students from the college. The college runs various programs for developing soft skills, language and communication skills, life skills and computing skills among the students. These capacity building and skill enhancement programs are conducted for the students each year. Digital Saksharta Program is one of the best examples of capacity building program. There is a competitive examination center through which students are benefited for guidance of competitive exam. Along with expert talk, regular coaching is provided to the students under competitive exam center. The college has constituted three different committees for resolving student grievances. These committees work with specific designed mechanism. Our college has shown good progression and placement during last 5 years. Total 240 outgoing students are placed and progressed from the college during last five years. While 3 students have qualified the State Eligibility Test (SET) for the post of Assistant Professor.

Our students have obtained 11 awards for outstanding performance in cultural activities organized by university and other institutes. Each year, college organizes various competitions and encourages students to participate in the competitions. On an average more than 30 sports and cultural competitions are organized each year for the students. The college has registered alumni association (Registration No. MAHA-57/2022 PALGHAR) as per the society's registration act, 1860 (XXI of 1860) and each year meetings are being conducted for the alumni. Alumni of our college has contributed in various forms to the college with financial support of Rs. 7.21724 lakhs. This financial support from the alumni is utilized for various purposes as to serve better to the students.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

Rayat Shikshan Sanstha is one of the largest educational institution which is functioning since 103 years in Maharashtra and caters education to the downtrodden. To provide higher educational facilities to the tribal students and prepare them to compete with urban students and to contribute their services to nation building by promoting education is our statement vision. The mission of our college is Let's help one another to make life comfortable, peaceful and help to one another to uplift the standard of life of poor, especially of tribal people.

At college level committees work concretely and have necessary freedom to implement decentralized

governance. Decentralization of administration through appointment of vice-principal and HoD. IQAC prepares perspective plans and the management support in implementation of suggestions. The college follows the "Performance Based Assessment System" (PBAS) for teaching staff which is prescribed by UGC in its regulations from July 2018. College non-teaching staff promotion is given as per guidelines of government of Maharashtra. The college provides financial support to the teaching and non-teaching staff for attending the seminars, workshops and conferences. The teachers of the college are relieved to participate in Refresher courses, Orientation courses, Summer/Winter Schools, etc. Rayat co-operative bank provides varied loan facilities and other saving schemes. Pension documents of retired staff are processed timely and service details are maintained up-to-date. The parent institute follows the rule and regulations of UGC and government of Maharashtra for the recruitments of teaching and non-teaching staff respectively. Most of the staff vacancies are fullfilled and management appointed required number of fulltime teachers on temporary and contractual basis. College has system for internal and external auditing from parent institution and Government of Maharashtra. Every year college has completed AAA (Academic and Administrative Audit) by parent institute. The IQAC is consistently working to magnify the quality culture in its all spheres of the college activities through channelized efforts towards promoting holistic academic excellence. IQAC acts as a mediator between management and college and provides inputs for sustenance of quality in each sphere of college activity.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The college regularly conducts programmes to address Gender equity. Security is provided to the students through CCTV cameras and entire campus is protected by chain linked compound wall. College has separate common rooms and separate washrooms for boys, girls and faculty. The bore-well and open-well are available sources for water consumption and there are facilities for rain water harvesting. Rain water is percolated inside bore-well to recharge the same and uplift ground water level. A national webinar was organised by the college to create awareness about water conservation and rainwater harvesting on 23rd April 2022.

Steps are taken to save energy through use of renewable energy resources coupled with LED lamps that helps to minimize the power requirements. Provisions are made for green initiatives and waste management. 2.7 KV capacity Solar Panels are installed as a source of renewable energy. Efforts are being made for Carbon neutrality through tree plantation, practicing use of one-side blank pages for printing, zero waste and plastic free campus. Most of the bio-degradable waste is recycled in 'Vermicomposting Unit'. College takes steps to promote message of Eco-mission through direct participation of staff and students in cleanliness drives and environment awareness programmes.

College has completed green audit and energy audit. Generous donors contribute to the development of tribal community through donation to help tribal students with various careers and training programmes, improve their health and help in raising their standard of living as a whole. The spirit of national integrity is instilled by organizing national festivals, celebration of culture and heritage, socially relevant events and birthdays of illustrious Indians.

Due to malnutrition among children and digital illiteracy in students of Mokhada tehsil, the college took initiatives for 'Eradication of malnutrition among children in Mokhada tehsil of Palghar District', 'Digital Saksharta Training Programme', which are the best practices of our college. The college also runs distinctive programmes like Biofloc Project, Bohada Festival, Earn and Learn scheme, Heritage Walk, Medicinal plants survey at Suryamal area, Tarpa Tribal Folk Dance and Varli Painting.

# Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	This college has always tried for a multidisciplinary approach in its academic as well as co-curricular activities. Students are also encouraged to formulate teams from different disciplines to participate in various events like sports and cultural. Students are encouraged to undergo innovative projects in the Interdisciplinary mode by formulating teams from subjects. Any disciplinary student from Mokhada and surrounding areas can participate in Digital Saksharata Training Programme which is certified by
	Saksharata Training Programme which is certified by NSDC and these are conducted by the college in collaboration with NIIT foundation and JM financial
	foundation. In order to make our students aware of the community engagement and service, the college

	offers 250 credit-based courses and add on courses in which issue such as community engagement and service, environmental education, and value-based are addressed. The foundation courses are implemented by University emphasizing Ecology and Environmental Education is made mandatory for all first and second year students. Biodiversity conservation and phytogeographical regions are covered in third year Botany paper. Environmental Science is an applied compulsory subject at third year B.Sc. level, in which a detailed project reports are prepared based on the surrounding area.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The institution is well prepared to implement the Academic Bank of Credits. It depends upon the guidelines of the mother institute 'Rayat Shikshan Sanstha', University of Mumbai and Higher Education Department, Government of Maharashtra. Till date the college has created Academic Bank of Credits ID of 76.85% students.
3. Skill development:	From Academic year 2021-22 our students have participated in Digital Saksharata Training Programme in collaboration with NIIT and JM financial foundation. The college also runs skill- based certificate courses for the interested students through which they will be trained on specific skills like biofloc fish farming, vermicomposting, biodiversity and conservation, fruit and vegetable processing, electrical maintenance, C++ programming etc. The students are presently being given hands-on exposure to practical subjects through small innovative projects, in which students identify their skills to produce some mini-projects and learn the concepts through experiential learning.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Varli painting is a sort of tribal art mostly created by the tribal people from the North Sahyadri Range in Maharashtra. This tribal art was originated in Maharashtra and the range encompasses cities such as Dahanu, Talasari, Jawhar, Palghar, Mokhada, and Vikramgad of Palghar district. In order to promote and conservation of this tribal art form, the college has organized various training programmes on 'Varli Painting'. The college has signed MOU with 'Adivasi Kala Savardhan and Vikas Sanstha, Jawhar' for training, promotion and coordination of Varli painting activities. These changes will also increase the employability opportunities for the

	students. 'Tarpa' is the most popular and colourful folk dance among the Varli, Kokna and Koli tribes, and is best seen in Palghar district of Maharashtra. This is one of the main attractions among the folk dance in Palghar district. Our college students have participated in University level cultural Programme i.e. Youth Festival and achieved first prize for the excellent performance in 'Tarpa' Tribal Folk Dance.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The college offers 250 courses across Arts, Commerce and Science. All these courses are offered as outcomes-based education (OBE) which are designed by University of Mumbai considering regional and global requirements. The college has implemented outcome-based education with clearly stated Program Outcomes (PO), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSO) and Course Outcomes (CO) and same are uploaded on the college website.
6. Distance education/online education:	The affiliating university of Mumbai and its learning centres have been offering distance education through Institute of Distance & Open Learning (IDOL) for various courses in UG and PG programs. Due to Covid -19 pandemic, the college used the digital platforms for engaging classes, conducting conferences and meetings. The college has successfully imparted all its courses content delivery in online mode during the Pandemic (COVID-19). The college conducted online examinations successfully by using guidelines of University of Mumbai, cluster college developed by university authorities. Online education has broken the physical barriers creating interaction of experts and students from different area.

# **1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation**

**1.1.1** The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

#### **Response:**

For effective curriculum delivery the institute strictly follows the curriculum designed by University of Mumbai, Mumbai.

i) The Principal invites a general staff meeting through IQAC, in the first week of the academic year for academic planning and also conducts a staff meeting at the end of each semester to observe progress of the semester.

ii) The Steering and Academic Planning Committee instruct to the respective Chairmen of all curricular, cocurricular, and extracurricular committees to plan the academic calendar consisting of curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities for effective implementation and delivery in the academic year.

iii) The college level committees find out the requirements of different courses at the departmental level.

iv) Academic Calendar: Academic calendar committee prepares the academic calendar to plan and implement the departmental activities without overlaps with other programs. The academic calendar is also made available on college website. The calendar includes internal examination and add on /short term /certificate courses. It carries approximate schedules regarding admission process, teaching-learning schedule, evaluation blue print, curricular and co-curricular activities, major departmental and institutional events to be organized and dates of holidays. The plan for home assignments, seminars, unit tests, quiz etc. are included in the academic calendar and are implemented.

v) **Academic Diary:** Academic diary is prepared for teaching learning process and the single point of academic evaluation. Every staff member prepares a lecture note a day in advance of their lecture to be engaged. The implementation of the teaching plan and lecture notes are supervised regularly by the head of the department.

vi) **Departmental Meeting:** Departmental meetings are organized at the beginning and at the end of each semester of every academic year. In the meeting following issues are generally discussed:

a) Syllabus distribution: The syllabus is distributed among the faculties according to their interest and teaching experience in the departmental meetings. It helps to execute our time table.

b) Teaching Plan: The individual teacher prepares his/ her semester-wise teaching plan.

Every month the head of the department informally discusses with the Principal about the progress of teaching and learning.

vii) **University Examination**: For smooth and fair conduct of examinations, college exam committee prepares exam time table well in advance as per guidelines of University of Mumbai and displays on college notice board as well as share on WhatsApp groups.

**Continuous internal assessment**: Some of the activities are intentionally organized for students to assess and upgrade their subject knowledge such as Prime Minister's 'Pariksha Pe Charcha' as a part of CIE. The departments prepare their own time table of internal evaluation such as unit tests, seminars etc. Field visit, study tours and project work are mandatory for some of the courses which help the student to sharpen their understanding of topic.

# **1.3 Curriculum Enrichment**

**1.3.1** Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

#### **Response:**

Overall progress of students is the main purpose of the curricula. In order to make students aware of the community life and human values, the college offers 10 programmes and 50 add on courses in which issues such as community sense and responsibility, gender, environment, sustainability and human values are addressed. The college has conducted 'Human Rights Education' through foundation course implemented by the university of Mumbai at first and second year students. Total 250 courses offered in all programs have one or other cross cutting issue as part of curriculum. While teaching the prescribed syllabus college organizes various activities to address the cross cutting issues such as:

## **Professional Ethics**

The professional ethics which prepare the students to practice proper ethical, moral and professional standards is a part of curriculum of foundation courses. In commerce and management, professional ethics are inculcated with the subjects like Rural marketing, Business Development, Accountancy, Business Law, Principle of management and Finance and Business Communications. Communication and soft skills have placed in many of these courses. Professional ethics are also integral part of curriculum in all programmes. In Commerce faculty, business skills, multifaceted economic and commercial values are incorporated in curricula.

#### Human Values:

The University has introduced subject of foundation course emphasizing "Concept of Disparity" and "Human Rights" in the curriculum to imbibe human values and make students ideal citizens. Human values are addressed in UG courses especially in the subject of History, Economics and Languages.

#### Gender:

The curricula laid emphasizes on Social, Economical, Historical and Geographical issues where in women's movement and gender equity are highlighted. The committees like Ladies Welfare and Antiragging are functional. Sex ratio, disparity and diversity, demographic composition, education of child mortality, reservation policies, constitutional provisions especially for women etc. are covered in Foundation courses. Feminist movement issues in History, Demographic issues in Economics.

#### **Environment and Sustainability:**

The foundation courses are implemented by University emphasizing Ecology and Environmental Education are made mandatory for first and second year students of B.A., B.Com. and B.Sc. Biodiversity conservation and phytogeographical regions are covered in third year Botany paper. Environmental Science is a compulsory subject at third year B. Sc. level, in which a detailed project reports are prepared based on the surrounding area.

Apart from these issues included in the syllabi of Mumbai University, the college has taken various steps to inculcate these issues among the students. The National Service Scheme (NSS), organizes environment awareness through the special one-week campaign programme. The unit organizes campaign frequently to generate hygiene and cleanliness awareness among natives, villagers. The NSS unit organizes 'Tree Plantation', 'Blood donation camp, 'AIDS awareness' etc. The NSS unit of the college actively participate in the national flagship programmes and address cross-cutting issues at community level. College organizes two lectures on the hygiene and sanitation to create awareness about health among girl students. Workshops on 'Women Empowerment' about women safety, security and employability have been organized by ladies welfare committee.

## **2.3 Teaching- Learning Process**

**2.3.1** Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

#### **Response:**

Apart from traditional Chalk Talk and Lecture Delivery methods, faculty is engaged in ICT based modern teaching tools and techniques. Every department plans the various methods to be adopted for teaching at beginning of the academic year. The meaningful teaching learning process is enriched with the help of modern pedagogies.

**Experiential Learning:** All Science departments use this experiential method through practical in courses. The concept of fundamental aspects of science learnt through practicals. Language departments showcase adapted movies to students to experience the crux of novels, drama and poetry. Students of Economics and Commerce are associated with nearby villages, banks, government departments for field projects.

**Participative Learning:** Participative learning invoked through study tours, field visits, group discussions, quizzes, assignments and projects. In all 50 short term courses are offered during last five years where students have participated. Every student has to complete at least three short term courses during his/her graduation. Vermicomposting is one such best example whereby student participation plays key role. Biofloc plant in collaboration with TERI for providing livelihood source to tribal communities is in progress at college premises.

**Problem Solving Method:** The students are asked to complete assignments and quizzes at the end of each unit. Moreover, students are encouraged to participate in Avishkar research convention at Zonal and University level. Some students are engaged in Soymate project which is run in collaboration with Mukul Madhav Foundation and Science & Technology Park, Pune.

All these methods help students to provide an opportunity for self-evaluation by improving their skills of listening, reading, speaking and writing.

The college has internet connectivity i.e. Wi-Fi campus. Each class room and laboratory is ICT enabled. Each department is using Google meet, Zoom meet, Google classroom and the college also uses LMS software 'Vriddhi'. The lectures are uploaded on college website and 'ASC College Mokhada' YouTube channel. The college has a PPT bank. Some of the departments use various softwares for effective curriculum delivery. These include ChemDraw 8.0 and Mendeley for Chemistry, Turbo C++ by Physics, RASMOL by Botany and Digital language software by English department. College library has installed NVDA screen reader software for the blinds. Social media groups were created and used by the college through its WhatsApp, Facebook and Telegram accounts. All students related notices, lecture time-table and other activities communicated via them.

Library e-learning resources are available to all the students in which CDs, DVD's, e-books and INFLIBNET, N-LIST facilities are being provided. NDLI, e-PG pathshala, Shodhsindhu, Shodhganga and NPTEL videos are available for students and faculty members.

The ICT and soft skill courses under the aegis of NSDC and in collaboration with NIIT foundation, New Delhi are important training program offered to the students. Teachers are also well versed with newer trends in ICT. They prepare their teaching plans, time tables, notes, presentations, demonstrations etc. on laptops and computers. ICT related online courses have been completed by all faculty members. The teachers are always motivated to enrol themselves for FDP on multimedia, ICT & blended learning courses.

# **2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**

Institutional data in the prescribed format

**2.5.1** Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

## **Response:**

Assessment of students is an integral part of academic institutions. For this, college has set up an Examination Committee under the chairmanship of Principal of the college. In the beginning of every academic year the college prepares academic calendar which includes assessment of internal examination, short term courses and the college & university examinations. Various methods of continuous internal evaluations viz. multiple choice questions, peer evaluation, project work, etc are practiced. Students are evaluated by well conveyed time-table before the start of internal assessment, unit tests/tutorials and projects are conducted regularly. The assessment work is carried out by the concerned subject faculty in the institution. The evaluation reports are prepared in stipulated time and communicated to the students in the classroom as well as displayed on the notice board. The answer books are shown on the demand of the students and guided them for lacunas while writing the answer scripts which boost their performance in the forthcoming examination of the university. All these activities are carried out in a well-planned and systematic manner. All short term / add on courses are assessed by the concerned subject teachers. Every student is enrolled himself for at least one course. Some of these courses are assessed by third parties like Karmveer Vidya Prabodhini, Satara and Gandhi Research Foundation, Jalgaon.

The institution has a well-defined system in place to deal with examination related grievances. The institution has adopted an online system where each student can view his/her total assessment marks at the

end of each semester and can report discrepancies, if any, within a specified time period to Examination Committee. Any query of students regarding the feedback and evaluation is thoroughly addressed by the respective teachers. Moderation is done as per guidelines of University of Mumbai which ensures transparency and accountability of examination process in the institution.

The grievances related to university examinations are forwarded to university of Mumbai for further action. The institutional reforms in continuous evaluation system are related to create interest for the study and to make the students more familiar with the university examination pattern. The institutional measures used for the internal/ external evaluation are to direct and lead the students confidently towards university examination. Hence there is very little scope for grievances regarding evaluation. The students have the freedom to use the suggestion box to put in the note of suggestion/instruction which can be considered for internal/external examination reforms.

All the mechanisms to deal with examination related grievances are transparent, time bounded and efficient. The college exam committee telecast live streaming of the "Pariksha Pe Charcha" to overcome students from the burden of exam related stress. Mentor-mentee Scheme also helps students to avert before going to the exam committee with their grievances, if any. It has also reduced exam related stress and anxiety of the exam appearing students.

## **Response:**

1. At the beginning of every semester/year, the subject teacher conveys Program Outcomes (POs)/Course Outcomes (COs) of each course at the introductory lecture of respective subjects or from institutional website www.asccmokhada.co.in

2. The copies of the syllabi are kept in the department. It is distributed at the beginning of the semester. However, the student can download the syllabus from the website of University of Mumbai www.mu.ac.in

3. Further, the faculty of every subject explains the course objectives, evaluation pattern, marking scheme etc. to the students. It is also given in the syllabus of each subject.

4. Following are the evaluation process of POs and COs. For post-graduate course (i) Seminar presentation (ii) Short quizzes or objective questions (iii) Home assignments (iv) Project work in syllabus. For undergraduate courses (i) Unit test on every unit or every paper as decided in the syllabus (ii) Black-board presentation, PPT presentations (iii) Quizzes or objective questions (iv) Semester wise examination (v) Field /Project work for environment studies and foundation course. The marks of internal exams are uploaded online to the university.

5. The Institute provides opportunities to students to exhibit their understanding through the medium of expression i.e. oral or written by participation in debate competitions and articles in college magazine 'Sanskruti'.

6. Keeping this in mind, some subject and topic wise extra-curricular activities are arranged e.g. Rangoli competition, PPT Presentation competition, celebration of Marathi Bhasha Pandharwada, Poetry reading, Poster Presentations, Road Safety Rally, Voter Awareness Rally, Women's day, Constitution day, Voter awareness day, AIDS awareness, Blood checking, Population awareness day etc. From these practices students can optimally express their knowledge and enhance their confidence.

7. The college follows the evaluation process of University of Mumbai as described above. This type of evaluation includes term end internal assessment for subjects such as Communications Skills in English, Environmental Science and Pollution, Mathematics Papers, Foundations Course, concurrent evaluations and External examinations conducted at the end of the course.

8. The examinations and results of University of Mumbai also measure the attainment of POs and COs of specific program/ course.

9. Students enrolled for Add On /Certificate Courses /Short term courses offered by the institution are evaluated by the institution itself. At the same time, observations of student knowledge and skills against measurable course outcomes are evaluated throughout the year.

10. The institution collects feedback from students, alumni, employers and parents which is an important method of measuring attainment with objectives of identifying the attainment level of students in terms of programme, subject, course and syllabus outcomes and to understand the overall impact of teaching learning process.

11. Students are encouraged to take up projects, fieldwork, etc. as part of evaluating POs and COs. This helps them to obtain necessary skills and practical experience in their chosen discipline.

12. Another parameter to measure attainment of POs and COs, of this tribal region institute is reflected in progression of students towards higher studies and in placements.

#### **Response:**

The Institutional Incubation Centre (IIC) has been launched in the academic year 2020-21 to instill innovative ideas and develop research culture among students and teachers. The college offers financial assistance through the incubation centre.

## Targets and objectives:

- To develop innovative insights among college students and teachers.
- To develop research oriented awareness within college students and teachers.
- To organize conferences and workshops on emerging research ideas for college students and faculty.
- To share research and innovative ideas with surrounding schools and colleges through exhibitions and lectures.
- To provide financial assistance to students and teachers at the initial stage.
- To file the Patents of innovative research.
- To establish various collaborations with other institutions, NGOs etc.
- To submit the research proposal to various funding agencies viz. DBT STAR college especially for science faculty etc.

## Activities conducted:

College faculty **Dr. R.K. Kadu** has published patent entitled 'Process for the preparation of 3-Pyrazolyl substituted-3-Hydroxy Oxindole Derivatives' on 25th December, 2020 by office of the controller general of patent, design & trademark, Government of India. Dr. V.B. Gade has published two patents at national level (Application No. 202221045945) and international level (Application No. WO 2022/195633 A2). Mr. R.A. Kawale also published a patent named Substituted 1,2,3 Triazole Compounds as Antioxidant Agent (Application No. 202221061719 A). The college has carried out 20 innovative projects aimed at motivating students towards the research. 110 students participated in various innovative projects that have been useful for tribal people and society. 60 students participated and presented their research projects in Avishkar Research convention of Mumbai University in 2020-21 and 2021-22. The students of science faculty have prepared scientific models with their own novel ideas and exhibited it in different scientific programme. Dr. A.N. Chandore received Excellent Scholar Award at International Botanical congress (IBC-2017), Shenzhen China. Dr. V.M. Dongardive received Mahatma Phule Eminent Researcher National Award 2022.

The college has organized various webinars, workshop and international conference to promote the scientific research among the students and teachers. # **Response:**

Faculty and students of the college are involved in a variety of activities to promote the idea of an institute neighborhood community network. Extension activities are an important part of college education. The student's active participation in these activities help them to understand the grass root level problems of the society. They become aware to face challenges of developing society. They notice inequities and the challenges posed to people's development.

The students serve the society as "Goodwill Ambassadors." The college motivates the NSS unit to participate in various programs during its regular meetings. The college acts as a catalyst in the area by demonstrating its institutional responsibility to society. The NSS unit is actively working in the surrounding communities. Most of the activities are focused on the Tree Plantation, Swatch Bharat Abhiyan, Environment protection, Water conservation awareness, Woman empowerment, etc. The college regularly organizes social awareness activities such as rallies, workshops, campaign, student exchanges, and collaborative activities in order to help students develop holistically. All government organizations such as Tehsil Office, Municipal Council, Panchayat Samiti, etc. and NGOs like, Deepak Foundation, Aroehan, Blood Banks, and Rural Hospitals have actively participated and supported the students to run and implement various programmes like Voter Awareness Campaign, Swachch Bharat Abhiyan, Digital Payment, Vittiya Saksharata Abhiyan, Health and Hygiene, Rallies of awareness regarding AIDS Day, Blood Donation Camps, Village Adoption, Tree Plantation, De-addiction and Stress Management. The college has organized a one-day 'Disaster Management Training' program in collaboration with the Tehsil office of Mokhada and the NDRF Battalion, Talegaon Dabhade. The college student forms the emotional bonds with the villagers through NSS special camps. The students have demonstrated exceptional initiative in the areas of cleanliness, soak pit construction, free health check-up camps and medicine distribution, road repairs, and playground construction. Covid awareness program, Mask distribution and awareness about mask and stationary distribution to the students of tribal area are examples of departmental outreach activities that promote institution-neighborhood, community network and student engagement. Covid vaccination program for students and the community was successfully organized by the college NSS unit. The college NSS unit has also organized an innovative program "Self Earning Guidance Program for Women's Self-Help Groups" at Pawarpada and Tulyachapada villages in Mokhada tehsil. In Warghadpada village, the Department of Zoology and Aroehan foundation, Mokhada collaboratively carried out Haemoglobin and Health checkup program for tribal women. To make tribal people aware about digital payments & cashless transactions, Department of Commerce conducted an innovative project for awareness of cashless transaction in tribal area of Warghadpada. Tribal people from Suryamal area of Mokhada tehsil are known for the use of various unknown plants for the treatment of fractured bones since centuries. Therefore, Department of Botany took initiative for collecting this information from Tribal people of Suryamal area and visit frequently at Suryamal area and play an important role to spread the

awareness in the society about use of this medicine.

# **Response:**

The college has been awarded with the Best NSS Unit Award and Best NSS Program Officer Award by University of Mumbai in the academic year 2020-21. Major Prof. R. S. Dubal, received prestigious award for extension activities in NCC. The government and government recognized organizations have honored and awarded the college for its contribution towards society. These are the following: The office of the Controller General of Patents, Design, and Trademarks has expressed its gratitude for hosting a webinar on intellectual property rights as part of the "Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav." Under this banner Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade, government of India has launched the National Intellectual Property Awareness Mission (NIPAM). This mission aims to create awareness among the students and teachers about Intellectual Properties such as Patents, Designs, Trademarks, Copyrights, and Geographical Indications. To provide livelihood opportunities to the tribal community, the college has established a Biofloc Technology training centre. Our college was recognized by The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI), CBD-Belapur, Navi Mumbai, for establishing Bio-floc Technology. Our college was also recognized by the JM Financial Foundation, Mumbai for the Digital Saksharta Project under skill India of NSDC, which was implemented for tribal students in the area during the years 2021-22. The courses offered through the Digital Saksharta Project are completely free of cost to all students of Mokhada and surrounding area.

During the Covid-19 pandemic, there was shortage of blood supply, the college organized a blood donation camp. The college has been recognized by the Patangshaha Kutir Hospital Blood Bank, Jawhar for organizing a blood donation camp and raising blood donation awareness in the community. Malnutrition is a major issue among tribal children in this area. To combat malnutrition problem, the college implemented a Scitech Soymate Project in collaboration with Mukul Madhav Foundation and Science and Technology Park, Pune, with support from the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India. Teachers from Zilha Parishad schools were trained and Scitech Soymate machines were distributed as part of this project. The college is working as a nodal agency for this project and recognized for this activity by the Science and Technology Park, Pune. This college has received recognition from the Ekatmik Bal Vikas Seva Yojana, Panchayat Samiti, Mokhada, Dist. Palghar, for its outstanding contribution in organizing various competitive examination guidance lectures and different NSS events. Vijay Thorat Research Foundation Pune has recognized our college for organizing Yoga Training Programme, Snehangan rehabilitation and mental health center appreciated the college for organizing awareness programme on "Effects of Addiction and Remedies to Overcome it". # **Response:**

Though the college is situated in tribal and remote area, to impart quality education to the tribal community college has developed adequate infrastructure having updated academic facilities. This college is situated in pollution free area and covered with green canopy. College is spread over 8.6 acres area of which total built up area is 34900 sq.ft.

# **Classrooms, laboratories and ICT facilities:**

There are 10 departments, 5 well equipped laboratories, 13 classrooms. All departments are provided with LCD projector, computer unit with high speed internet facility. The college functions through 4 separate buildings, in building no. 1 (Block-A) there is Principal's cabin, administrative office and meeting hall. In newly constructed building no. 2 (Block-B), there are 4 laboratories, 9 classrooms, 4 departments, IQAC room, staff room, dark room, conference hall, research lab and incubation centre. In building no. 3 (Block-C) there are library, reading room, language lab, exam department, NSS room, two classrooms, students' welfare and development centre, skill development centre, Gymkhana and six departments. In building no. 4 (Block-D) there are well equipped three *Digital Saksharta Labs*, smart class room, competitive examination & IBPS centre and two classrooms. Further the college campus is having a canteen, staff quarters, principal's residence, guest house, biofloc project room, security guard room, vehicle parking, botanical garden and a playground. For developing entrepreneurship skills among the tribal students college has a training center of biofloc system.

To keep the pace with competitive world and to develop good communication skills among the tribal students college has established Digital English language lab having 10 computers and essential accessories. Safe drinking water is made available through RO filtered water facility. For monitoring and surveillance CCTV cameras have been installed.

# Infrastructural Details-

Computers (114), Laptops (11), LCD Projector (13), Bar Code Reader (01), Bar Code Printer, (01), Printers (17), Digital Camera (02), TV (04), CCTV (53), Public Auditory System (02), Biometric Machine (02), Battery Backup system (07), Fire Extinguisher (19), Green Boards (15), White Boards (07) Smart interactive Board (01), Generators (02).

# Cultural activities:

As the college has been located in hilly tribal area having its own culture and traditional tribal culture and traditions which cannot be found in semi-urban or urban areas. Hence, the college has developed a strong unit of Cultural department. The college provides good environment to cultivate cultural minds of students. Cultural unit is well equipped with necessary musical instruments.

# Gymnasium, Sport and Yoga:

Gymkhana is well equipped with all infrastructural facilities necessary for indoor and outdoor games. The college ground has 200 meters running track, central part of track is utilized for Kabaddi, Volleyball, Kho-Kho and Cricket. Gymkhana is being used for playing games such as Wrestling, Chess, Judo, Carom, Boxing, etc. The college has regular organized various activities related to Yoga. The college has provided multi-Gym facilities for palyers.

# 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), subscription to eresources, amount spent on purchase of books, journals and per day usage of library

# **Response:**

The college has a rich library as learning resource center. It is having well furnished rooms of 2050 sq. ft. area. The open access facility helps easy access for students. Library is automated. Recognizing the need to spread knowledge, the college library is enriched with 21,697 books comprising, great novels, autobiographies, encyclopedia, reference books, text books, etc. The college has a special book bank scheme for SC/ST/NT and needy students. This book bank comprises 3449 books. The library is having 18 periodicals, journals and magazines of varied sectors. Annually updated periodicals and magazines are

made available to all the staff and students. So as to keep eye on national and international daily news and to prepare for competitive exam. Our reading room of college library is provided with 7 daily newspapers of Marathi and English languages.

The college library is having books in soft copy (PDF format). In the COVID-19 pandemic these books pdf files are made available to the students via social media tools like WhatsApp and Telegram groups.

Library has good number of CD/DVD collection containing drama, speech, reference books etc., as well as rare books collection.

# Integrated Library Management System (ILMS):

The library is having ILMS software named LIBRERIA with full version of 2.0.3715.28728. The LIBRERIA software is working on internet and cloud based. To search books in minimum time the college library has made available the WEB-OPAC (WEB-Online Public Access Catalogue) facility system. The college has also purchased 'Vriddhi' Software for campus management, complete student life cycle and administrative work.

### Subscription to e-resources:

The college library has active subscription of INFLIBNET N-List consortia, e-ShodhSindhu which provides e-journals, e-books on various subjects. This consortium helps to promote remote access to the users with 6,000+ journals, 1,99,500+ ebooks under N-LIST and 6,00,000 ebooks. To upgrade the library facilities and to make available the recent literature to students and staff, the college purchases books each year.

# Per day usage of library:

The massively available facilities of the library are utilized by the students, teaching and non-teaching staff. The separate register for students and staff is maintained to keep record of users of the library. The students visit the library to exchange the books, and to use reading room of the library. Separate and well equipped reading room facility are made available to the students. Per day usage of library facility indicates the good utilization of library resources. The college library also provides remote e-resources facility and most of the students and teachers are using this facility.

The college library has functional MoUs with other two institutes for inter library loan agreement.

# **Response:**

To avail our students good quality facilities of information technology infrastructure, the college constantly upgrades these facilities. Keeping in mind the need of providing facilities of modern technology world, the college assesses the ground root conditions of the college and the facilities available in the technology world. In accordance with this the special provision is made to upgrade these facilities, further for technical assistance the expert services are hired timely for maintaining hardware and information technology infrastructure.

The college provides active and free wi-fi services to all the students in the campus. All classrooms are connected to internet through high speed wi-fi facility. All the laboratories and classrooms are well equipped to conduct ICT enabled lectures and practicals. The college has 13 LCD projectors, 11 laptops and 114 computers with access to internet that are updated with latest versions of essential softwares. The computers are connected with Wi-Fi facilities. Institution frequently updates its IT facilities through various systems. For updating and maintenance of the IT facilities college has Network Resource Center (NRC), internet connectivity and computer maintenance committee. As per the demands of the departments and students this committee makes necessary development in the IT facilities. For further technical assistance expert services are hired.

As per the needs and growing demand new computers are added. Internet facilities are also provided as per the latest and fastest technologies available.

The college has well established mechanism for upgrading and deploying Information technology infrastructure. The provision is made in the budget for annual maintenance and technical staff is appointed for maintaining hardware and Information Technology infrastructure of the campus.

The classrooms are given advanced equipments and other essential facilities like electrical power supply with Battery backup, facility for high speed communication links, LCD projectors to all departments, designed furniture, anti-virus for all computers, etc.

As per the requirement of the maintenance of the above IT equipments, college has internet connectivity and computer maintenance committee which uses their skill to update and repair the equipments. However, for major disorder and damage, computer technicians and service providers are hired.

The steps like installation of anti-virus periodically, formatting of computers on the basis of corrupt operating system and replacing of hardware of old computers to new computers are taken for maintaining and utilizing computers. The college has subscription of '*Zoom*' software for conducting online meetings,

seminars, webinars and conferences. The college has purchased '*Vriddhi*' Software for campus management, complete student life cycle and administrative work. To meet the speed of global competencies, the college has provided high speed internet facilities of 200 mbps bandwidth. The college has wi-fi campus and we provide free internet services to the students through wi-fi.

Most of our alumni are having their own businesses and extend their help in maintenance activities of the college. In recent years the college has been developing new additional infra-structure and during construction of these new buildings alumni members have provided various services at very low cost or sometime free of cost.

# 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

# **Response:**

The college is fully aided by the government of Maharashtra and included under section 2(f) section 12 (b) of the UGC Act, 1956. It is eligible to receive the grants under various schemes of UGC. The college mobilizes funds for its regular activities from various agencies. Apart from this, the college mobilizes funds through alumni contribution/donation, individuals etc. The college generates financial resources through its stake holders government, CDC, NGOs, Affiliated University, local well- wishers, alumni and public representatives. The parent institute helps us to mobilize more fund to create well-furnished and healthy campus for the students. The IQAC always search the new resources for mobilizing funds and it has developed systematic procedures for the optimal utilization of these resources. The college has tried to generate funds in form of money and objects. The college has very transparent mechanism of an auditing committee for utilizing this grant and resources has been appointed by the parent institute.

The members of CDC, teaching and administrative staff, existing alumni students contribute to mobilize the resources for college. Students' tuition fees, gratitude funds and the college development funds are the sources of resource mobilization.

# **Response:**

As per the NAAC guidelines, college has established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The IQAC is consistently working to magnify the quality culture in its all spheres of the college activities by channelized efforts towards promoting holistic academic excellence. The primary aim of the IQAC is to develop a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action towards quality sustenance and quality enhancement. It plays an instrumental role in designing/framing and implementing the policies for the betterment of the college and its stakeholders. The institutional policy with regard to quality assurance is as follows:

# **1. ICT Teaching and Learning:**

Since the first cycle of the NAAC, the management has always been emphasizing on the use of ICT enable teaching and learning in the college. Therefore, the all departments use ICT devices methods such

as LCD projectors, YouTube video links and ICT based teaching including Google Classroom, Zoom meets, Google meets, WhatsApp group for sharing links and videos etc.

# 2) Transforming Traditional Classrooms to Digitized Classrooms:

In the last phase of NAAC first cycle, college left behind its traditional teaching learning evaluation methods. IQAC, as per the productive suggestions by IQAC and CDC, acutely chalked out the transformation of the traditional classrooms into the digitized one. Gradually, the chalk, duster and blackboard teaching combined with the LCD projectors, pointers, power point presentations, video conferencing. The college has established collaboration with J. M. finance and NIIT, Delhi. Now the classrooms are witnessing the joyful learning and the better understanding by the students. Teachers are now using ICT tools like YouTube, Google class and creating their videos for the Sanstha you-tube channel.

# 3. Outcome Oriented Teaching through Certificate and Add on Courses:

As per the discussion in governing body, CDC and IQAC meeting, it was decided to introduce the various add on and certificate courses in support of their regular teaching learning methodologies. Guest lectures in collaboration with other institutes are also arranged for providing exposure to the students. The college has introduced need based add-on courses as a regular practice to bridge the gap between the university curricula and the market demands. Right now, college runs twenty-two certificate / add on courses. These courses are free of cost and help student to become familiar with the application of their classroom teaching learning.

This college is located in tribal area. Students seeking admissions are from nearby villages. The government and NGO's are collaboratively involved in the developmental activities and programs. Boards and banners of environmental awareness, social harmony and values are displayed in the campus.

The college regularly organizes different activities for inculcating the values of tolerance, harmony towards cultural diversities. Cultural diversities of tribal region are maintained by organizing cultural events. Students present folk arts in Youth Festival organized by University which reflects a very positive impact on the society's cultural and communal thought. Marathi Bhasha Din and Shravani Kavi Sammelan is organized which reflects linguistic harmony towards Marathi Language. A short term course "Tribal Handicrafts" is run and Jagatik Adivasi Din is celebrated which indicates cultural, regional and communal harmony towards tribal community.

Communal socio-economic harmony is maintained by organizing Poshan Pakhawada (Nourishment week), Blood Donation Camp and Yoga Training. The college also organizes the Gandhian Thoughts Examination in collaboration with Gandhi Research Foundation, Jalgaon. Thus, the college has created positive image in the society.

The college contributes in developing social values among pupils for their social development, support to economically weaker students. The mottos of the Sanstha '*Education through self-help*' and '*Earn and Learn*' reflect the dignity of labor and self reliance.

# 2) Objectives of the Practice:

- To tackle malnutrition of children in tribal and remote area of Mokhada tehsil of Palghar district.
- To make Soymilk available to tribal children of Primary Schools.
- To reduce number of child deaths due to malnutrition in tribal and remote areas of Palghar district.
- To enable children physically and mentally fit for education and service of nation, which was a dream of Padmabhushan Dr. Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil.

# 3) The Context:

Palghar district has witnessed serious malnutrition problem in children since many years and increased more in number since the lockdown began on March 2020. As Mokhada is one of the tribal and remote places, tribal communities have very low earning source. So they cannot afford essential food and ultimately due to lack of meal it affects on their nutrition especially in their children which leads to low immunity and often to death. To overcome this difficult situation, college has undertaken malnutrition

eradication initiative.

College is playing very important role as a Nodal agency for distribution and training on Scitech Soymate machines by Science and Technology Park, Pune in association with finance partner Finolex Pipes Industries Limited, Pune and CSR partner Mukul Madhav Foundation, Pune.

Soymilk is a good alternative to regular milk as it contains high quality Proteins, Vitamins, Carbohydrates, Sugars, Fibers, and trace elements which forms complete dietary supplement for children.

# 4) The Practice:

Scitech Soymate machines are distributed to 10 Government Pre and Primary schools in and around Mokhada tehsil by college and its collaborating partners. A hands on training is given to teachers along with other staffs by the Trainer Mr. Vaibhav Nimgire from Science and Technology Park, Pune. The machine needs only 250 grams of Soybean seeds and it produces 5 liters' soymilk only in 40 minutes. A committee of two Assistant Professor and 10 students is formulated and appointed to focus on the project. The role of this committee is to keep the record of height, weight and health status of the selected children from each school, also to resolve problems in making availability of soymilk. All 10 schools provide soymilk to the children twice in a week. A primary survey of 568 students from Primary Government schools are benefited from this initiative.

### 5) Evidence of success:

- Gain in Weight of children.
- Increase in Height of children.
- Overall impact on body posture of children.
- Improvement in immunity among children.

It has been observed that the significant improvement in overall health status of children and also students feel healthy after the consumption of Soymilk.

# 6) Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

The college constantly striving for health of children in tribal and remote area of Mokhada. The problems are encountered i.e.funds are not available for purchase of soybean and sugar as well as little interruption in this work due to the lack of electricity.

# 1) Title of Best Practice-2: Digital Saksharta Training Programme: A Career Development Center

# 2) Objectives of the Practice:

- To bridge the digital divide in rural areas, by imparting computer literacy to students.
- The project also aims to train youth from rural areas in professional IT certificate courses for better employability.
- To impart soft and communication skills in local students.
- To enhance the overall quality and skill development among tribal students.

# 3) The Context:

Since lockdown of COVID-19 pandemic, almost all colleges, schools and companies completed their work from home using computers that shown us the importance of knowledge of a computer. Students, especially in tribal and remote areas of Mokhada, loose precious educational time due to lack of knowledge and availability of digital media like computers and internet. To overcome this situation, the college took initiative in making Digital Hub for students in college campus itself. The college in association with JM Financial foundation, Mumbai in collaboration with NIIT Foundation, New Delhi have done remarkable precious job in installing such Digital centre which come under NSDC. The Centre has been set up as **finished school** with a view to impart computer literacy to the students not only from our college but also other students of various age groups from in and around Mokhada. A well-equipped training center with 50 computers. Besides the computer education, efforts will be made for personality development of the students and placement of students of this tribal area.

# 4) The Practice:

The aim of activity is to inculcate IT skills and digital literacy among the tribal students. The college has taken good initiative and created balance while running a good venture of Digital Saksharta Training Programme. Each classroom has essential amenities, well equipped with various software installed computers and internet. All the courses are provided at free of cost. Total three different courses run by the digital centre. All courses are accredited under Skill India and National Skill Development Corporation. The regular training is given to the students via lecture and hands on training. After completing the duration of the course, conclusive exam is conducted and successful students get certificate of completed specified course.

# 5) Evidence of success:

- Enhancement of digital literacy among students.
- Development of soft skills and communication skills among students.
- After successfully completion of the course, 71 students got placement.

Digital Saksharta centre is helping them to built-up their confidence and create positive attitude towards not only the professional IT skills but also soft and communication skills. It has been found that students get more involved and keep sharing their thoughts/ideas in a class and open up in the hands on training.

# 6) Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

We consider the tribal and hilly area not as a problem but an opportunity to serve the people. Even today people follow and practice traditional customs. It's the challenge to the college to bring them into flow of light and educate them, and make them available for service of nation through digital literacy and IT professional skills. Some students attend their classes late due to lack of transportation facilities.

# 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

# **7.3.1** Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

# **Response:**

This college is the only aided Higher Education Institution in the tehsil to cater the educational needs of Mokhada nearby vicinity of students. It has been restated that the college is shaping up physically and mentally through public participation. The college is involved in educating tribal, downtrodden and economically weaker sections of the society from the Palghar district. About 8.6 acres of land of the college is donated by Government of Maharashtra to the parent institute Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara. The college has a reputation for doing good for the tribal community. Due to this dedicated work, alumni, various NGOs, philanthropists and generous people whole heartedly offer donations to the college to facilitate the community. For construction of the New Shatabdi Building and administrative building, Rs. 1 crore by parent institute Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Rs. 1 crore have donated by Hon'ble President Shri. Sharadchandraji Pawar and Rs. 2 crore donated by Hon'ble Loknete Ramsheth Thakur through Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara.

In this way, major donors contributed to the development of tribal community by donating through college administration for betterment of tribal students with various careers and training programs which ultimately improve their health and standard of living as a whole. Therefore, it's moral responsibility of the institution to make die hard efforts to empower the nearby rural youth and return something to the society. For this purpose, CDC, IQAC and stakeholders are rigorously working through various programmes and organizing innovative activities. A good yardstick of institutional success is the alignment of its behavior and initiatives with its vision and mission.

# Areas of Priority and Thrust:

The college is strongly committed towards the development of youth and the history and culture of the Mokhada tehsil. The college has following distinctive programmes i.e. Biofloc Project, Earn and Learn scheme, Innovative Programmes, Medicinal plants survey of Suryamal area, Varli Painting, etc.

**1) Biofloc Project:** The Energy Resources Institution, Mumbai in collaboration with college installed Biofloc technology project for fish farming techniques for tribal people concerned with getting job and occupation.

2) Varli Painting: Varli painting is a form of tribal art mostly created by the tribal people from the North Sahyadri Range in Maharashtra and especially in Palghar district. In order to promote and conservation of

this tribal traditional art form, the college has organized various training programme on 'Varli Painting'. The college has signed MOU with 'Adivasi Kala Savardhan and Vikas Sanstha, Jawhar' for training, promotion and coordination of Varli painting activities. These changes will also increase the employability opportunities for the students.

**3) Tarpa Tribal Folk Dance**: is the most popular and colourful folk dance among the Varli, Kokna and Koli tribes, and is best seen in Palghar district of Maharashtra. This is one of the main attractions in Palghar district. The students from our college have participated in University level cultural Programme i.e. Youth Festival and received first prize for the excellent performance in 'Tarpa' Tribal Folk Dance.

**4) Heritage Walk:** The college has organized 'Heritage Walk' through field visit on the fort Bhaskargad by involving the students, also a field visit was taken to Vashala caves at Vashala. There are various historical monuments (Viragal) at Khoch, Palasunde, Chas, Palaspada, Nangarmol, Wakharicha Pada in Mokhada area.

**5) Bohada Festival:** The Mokhada is one of the oldest and historical cities and has holistic background and **Bohada** is one of the most important tribal festivals in the Mokhada area. After Holi, this festival is celebrated every night for five days in the guise of characters from Ramayana and Mahabharata. College students actively participate in this festival.

6) Earn and Learn Scheme: This is one of the best example to describe the approach of the college towards students. The college runs the scheme for all the students who belong to socially and economically weaker class. The students have been working for two hours either in the library or in the office and paid for this work. This scheme is supported by the college through its own funds.

**7) Innovative Programmes:** To develop innovative insights among college students and teachers, the college has carried out 20 innovative projects. Total 110 students participated in various innovative projects that have been useful for tribal community and common people in the society at large.

**8) Medicinal plants survey of Suryamal area:** Tribal people from Suryamal area of Mokhada tehsil are known for the use of various unknown plants for the treatment of fractured bones since centuries. Therefore, Department of Botany took initiative for collecting this information from Tribal people of Suryamal area and visit frequently at Suryamal area and play important role to spread the awareness in the society about use of this medicine.

**9)** Social Activities: The college organizes 'Blood Donation, Haemoglobin and Health Check-Up Camps' not only for the students and staff but schools and other people from nearby villages. The college has organized an innovative programme of 'Vaccination Campaign' in collaboration with 'Rural Hospital, Mokhada'. This campaign was made tremendously successful by the students and staff. After the appeal by the college, nice response given by college staff and students as well as citizens from Mokhada. This vaccination campaign was much appreciated by Hon'ble joint director of higher education, Konkan region, government of Maharashtra in online review meeting of Palghar district on 30th October 2021.

The college is surrounded by natural beauty i.e., fruit trees, huge peepal tree, beautiful ornamental garden, mango garden and botanical garden with medicinal plants.

**Quality infrastructure for quality education:** The college is expanding its infrastructural facilities with the chronological timescale. Each and every stakeholder feels free to suggest the ideas for the development

of the college. It is the promise of the college to empower the tribal youth with quality education. Many students are benefitted from the college infrastructure and joined the services in private and public sector.

It is the dream of our college to embolden the talent of students and let them emerge. This can be achieved only through disciplined systematic education which college is imparting.

The Botany department of college has organized an international conference on "Biodiversity, Conservation and Role of Molecular Phylogenetics in Plant Systematics-2022 (BCMP-2022)". The college also organized an international conference in collaboration with BRICKS World of Traditions, Moscow, Russia, and Snehavardhan Research Institute, Pune on "The Contribution and Achievements of Men in Various Spheres at National and International Levels".

The college has adopted "Nashera" village and especially focused on primary school students for improvement of their academic development with socio-economic status under the leadership of alumni of Mr. Ravi Dadu Dhinda (Sarpanch of Nashera Village). College regularly organizes various activities at Nashera village for upliftment of standard of lives viz., by the provision of RO water, distribution of needy materials for the students, creating awareness among the students by street play for eradication of superstition and awareness for conservation of biodiversity.

Recently Department of Science and Technology (DST), Government of India has approved a project proposal entitled "Innovative interventions in Mokhada Block of Palghar district to address malnutrition and enhance the livelihood of Scheduled Tribe (ST) Communities" for the college worth a total cost of Rs.150.12307 lakhs in collaboration with The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI), Navi Mumbai, Maharashtra.

# **Concluding Remarks :**

The institute aims towards capacity building for occupational and local needs, improved basic knowledge and quality of life through quality education. The disciplines are artistic, creative, culturally rooted and contemporary.
